Getting to Know Me

1. What do you think is the weirdest thing people believe even though there is a great deal of evidence against it (i.e. flat earth...)? Why do you think they continue believing it?

Digging Deeper

- 2. What new insight or information did you learn as you engaged in Pastor Phil's sermon this Sunday?
- 3. Read Mark 12:1-8.
 - What questions or initial reactions arise as you hear this?
 - What words would you use to describe the landowner and the tenants? Why?
 - Break down the allegory: Who is the owner? Who are the tenants? What does the vineyard represent? Who are the servants and the son?
- 4. Read Isaiah 5:1-7. What more could the owner of the vineyard (God) have done for the people of Israel? In what ways did the vineyard (Israel) produce bad fruit? How does Jesus recast and retell this parable?
- 5. Read Mark 12:9-12. If the religious leaders recognized Jesus' parable as targeting them and how they had rejected God's many messengers, why did they continue to plot to kill Jesus? What was their motivation?

- 6. Read Psalm 118:22-23. What is a "capstone" or "cornerstone"? In what ways does Jesus epitomize these words? Why do you think Jesus quoted this scripture passage here?
- 7. Read Mark 1:11, Mark 9:7 and John 3:16. How do these verses shed new light on the owner's words in Mark 12:6?
 - How does God the Father feel about his Son Jesus and why did he send him to die in our place? What does this say about the character of God: His love for us? His justice? His desire for reconciliation to us?

Making It Personal:

- 8. In Mark 12:9, there is judgment from the owner. Share your thoughts or struggles with the idea that God will judge those who reject him in the end? How does II Peter 3:9 help you understand God's merciful heart amidst his justice?
- 9. The religious leaders opposed Jesus to hold onto their power and status. What motivates us when we oppose Jesus' authority in our lives?
- 10. Ultimately, Jesus' rejection opened the door for our redemption. Spend some time meditating on these scriptures and this beautiful truth this week.
- 11. As you wrap up your Growth Group session, how has God grown you over these past 10 weeks? Year?
